His 100·01: Introduction to Historical Inquiry – The Prophet Muhammad Fall 2023

#### Course Description:

This courseprovides an introduction to issues of historical causation, rgumentation, and evidence by exploring the life and impact of the prophet Muhammacon the Arabian Peninsula and West Asia in the early sevent hentury. We will begin with an introduction to the study of history and historical methods. From here, we will read a variety of primary and secondary sources in order to answer the question: Who was the Prophet Muhammad?

## Course Requirements:

This is a seminarcourse It is imperative that each student carefully read all of the assigned readings on time and come to class ready to participate inclass discussion.

In this course, we will focus on reading rimary texts and thinking abouthow to interpret them. Learning how to read and interpret primary texts is a deceptively complex task, so we will carry out this charge in a variety of ways, through formal and informal writing and through class discussion. Its vital that you prepare all the reading and be open to the difficulty of this seemingly simple task.

In addition, there will be series of formal assignments lesigned to use you to evaluate and evaluate primary texts. The final assignment will be an annotated bibliography for a research projecton Muhammad. Each the writing assignment designed to romote a different way of reading history and to help push you to cate historical informatio from primary sources. They can also all be seen as different ways of preparing you for the final annotated bibliography, which requires you to envisage project that employs the skills we will develop in this course.
