### Assignments and Grading

Your grade in this class will be based on these requirements:

**Five short analyses of primary texts** (15% of your total grade). During the first half of the semester, you will have eight opportunities (marked \*\*\* on the syllabus) to write a 1-to-1.5-page analysis of one of the primary sources we'll be reading for class; you need to hand in five of these analyses (including the first one, due on Wednesday, February 1.) In each case, I will post a question for you to answer on the course's Pioneerweb page soon after the previous class and you will write a brief essay answering that question, according to specifications included in a separate handout. A hard copy of your document analysis will be due at the start of class. (Note that you cannot hand in one of these assignments late, since they're intended to give you the chance to analyze the course readings before we discuss them in class. Plan accordingly!)

**Three 4-to-5-page papers** (30% of your grade). These three papers will all involve the synthesis of readings assigned for this class. The first (due on Thursday, March 15, at 5:00 PM) will be a comparison of Ivan the Terrible and Peter the Great; the second (due on Thursday,
